KDHE Training Requirements for Licensed Foster Families

K.A.R. 28-4-806. Training.

- (b) In-service training. Each licensee shall obtain at least eight clock-hours of training in each licensing year, including at least two clock-hours obtained through participation in group training, including workshops, conferences, and academic coursework. The training topics shall provide the opportunity to develop competency in two or more of the following areas.
- (1) Attachment issues and disorders:
- (2) behavior and guidance, including managing aggressive behavior

and de-escalation methods, including the use of time-out;

- (3) child development;
- (4) communicating with the families of children in foster care;
- (5) constructive problem solving;
- (6) health;
- (7) home safety;
- (8) human sexuality;
- (9) interactions with children;
- (10) regulations governing family foster homes;

- (11) medication administration;
- (12) post-traumatic stress disorder;
- (13) separation issues; and
- (14) specific topics related to children with special needs.

(c) Additional training requirements.

(1) Each licensee shall participate in any additional or alternative training required by the sponsoring child-placing agency.

Each licensee who fails to meet training requirements for any licensing year shall complete a corrective action plan developed with the sponsoring child-placing agency to comply with prior licensing year requirements. The training hours obtained under the corrective action plan shall apply only to the prior licensing year. Failure to successfully complete the corrective action plan within 30 days after the initiation of the corrective action plan may result in an enforcement action.

- (2) Each corrective action plan shall include the licensee's plan for maintaining compliance with this regulation.
- (3) A licensee shall not accept any new child for placement until the sponsoring child-placing agency documents that the corrective action plan has been successfully completed by the licensee and the training obtained by the licensee that meets the requirements of subsection (b).

Tips From KVC Pediatrics

Enterovirus: EV-D68

Enteroviruses are spread by close contact with an infected person. You can also become infected by touching objects or surfaces that have the virus on them and then touching your mouth, nose, or eyes. The vast majority of children with enteroviruses such as EV-D68 have mild symptoms and do not need any medical care beyond what is done for the common cold.



A number of children with asthma and even some without a prior history of wheezing have had unusually severe cases of EV-D68 resulting in hospitalization; some requiring treatment in the intensive care unit. Children with high fever and those with cold symptoms lasting longer than 7-10 days should talk with their pediatrician. Those with difficulty breathing should seek emergency care. This virus seems to be particularly hard on children's lungs. Therefore, it is especially important for parents of children previously diagnosed with asthma to help your child follow their asthma action plans and make sure the child's caregiver and/or teacher is aware of the condition. It's also imperative that they know how to avoid asthma triggers and what to do if the child experiences any symptoms related to asthma.

To reduce the risk of infection with enteroviruses:

- Wash hands often with soap and water for 20 seconds, especially after changing diapers.
- Avoid touching, eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Avoid kissing, hugging, and sharing cups or eating utensils with people who are sick.
- Disinfect frequently touched surfaces, such as toys and doorknobs, especially if someone is sick.
- Stay home when feeling sick, and consult with your health care provider.

Remember, enterovirus is different from the flu! Flu season is just around the corner. To protect against the flu virus, the American Academy of Pediatrics recommends all children ages six months and older get their flu vaccine at the earliest possible time.

Non-Related Kinship Families

Did you know that if you are a Non-Related Kinship placement (NRKIN) once you receive your full license you can amend your license? Then you can provide care and be a placement option for other children in foster care.

A NRKIN is a placement option willing to become a licensed foster home to care for a specific child in DCF custody. The person or family is familiar with the child or the birth family and would like to provide a home for the child until they can be reintegrated or other permanency options are determined. Please contact your Family Service Coordinator for more information.
